1. “Emerging Aging Issues – Lifelong Learning for all Ages.” Panel discussion with experts in the field. Moderated by AAUW NC member Helen Martikainen
2. “Taking Stock of North Carolina’s Schools: Where are we, How far do we have to go?” The speaker is John N. Dornan, president and executive director of the Public School Forum of North Carolina.
3. “Girls on Track: What research says about smart girls and development strategies that encourages them to study mathematics and science.” The speaker is Dr. Sarah Berenson, director of the Center for Research in Mathematics and Science (CRMSE).
4. “Ten Thousand Villages: Making a difference for people of diverse cultures/Exploring the principles of fair trade”. The speaker is Sarah Pearson, the executive director of Ten Thousand Villages in Raleigh.

Other speakers

Mary Ellen Smyth, President of the AAUW Educational Foundation, will speak at the luncheon. The Educational Foundation provides funds to advance education, research and self-development for women and to foster equity and positive societal change. It is the world's largest source of funding exclusively for graduate women. Two fellows funded by the Foundation will speak at the opening session.

Kathy Sokol, AAUW Legal Advocacy Fund supported plaintiff, will speak at the breakfast. The Legal Advocacy Fund is the nation's largest legal fund focused solely on sex discrimination in higher education. It is also sponsoring a “Campus Outreach Program” on Friday, April 4.
